Laden with secrets and shrouded in medieval drama, Seckford Hall Hotel in Suffolk promises an unforgettable stay in this magnificent historic manor


Veering off the bustling main road, past the gatehouse and down to the winding drive, visitors to Seckford Hall are quickly whisked away from the busy outside world to a striking red brick Tudor manor set within 34 acres of glorious Suffolk countryside. Transporting their guests to a peaceful escape close to the beautiful market town of Woodbridge and stunning Heritage Coast, Seckford Hall offers a luxurious stay that promises to leave a lasting impression with its guests.

The hotel as it appears today first began to take shape around 1530, though was likely built some time before that by its original owner, Thomas Seckford. His son, also called Thomas, was a prominent lawyer and official at the court of Queen Elizabeth I, well regarded in Woodbridge for his generosity to the poor. Though the Hall has undergone some changes over the

years, thanks to Sir Ralph Harwood who rescued the hall from demolition in 1940, it still oozes the original soul of a Tudor building, encompassing a real sense of medieval drama with its dark furnishings, wood panelling and resident suits of armour. It is even thought that beneath the Hall lies a series of secret tunnels leading to Woodbridge, a source of inspiration for the likes of Enid Blyton who stayed at the hotel. Once a site of sumptuous feasts and mingling in the Great Hall, and where Queen Elizabeth once held court, the Hall is today a home away from home carefully taken care of by passionate Operations Director Mark Suddes, who is intent on providing a relaxed and comfortable retreat for all who pass its door.

Upon entering the hotel, guests won't fail to be mesmerised by the intricate wood carvings adorning fireplaces and doors,


surrounded by linenfold panelling across the entire ground floor. As though stepping into a museum with all the modern comforts, bedrooms are scattered with oil paintings, old leather chests and some with four poster beds, each mixed with plush, comfy cushions, flat screen TVs, fluffy towelling robes, elegant White Company toiletries and swanky coffee machines. 
