uring a recent visit to the region George Osborne called for scientists to advise him on how to spend a multi-million pound budget for the science sector over the next ten years

On his agenda was transport infrastructure and closer links between the Norwich and Cambridge science hubs - all of which will, no doubt, have beneficial impact on the dynamic business community of East Anglia as a whole.

However, let us hope the Chancellor is also aware that we have similar needs and issues here in Suffolk.

I hope that within his considerations he will be including Haverhill Research Park. Currently under development, the park is conveniently located on the

Cambridgeshire/Essex/Suffolk borders, and a recent new addition to the greater Cambridge technology and office hubs.

The park has immense potential to host a thriving business community. With space ranging from 200sq ft for a single occupancy suite within the managed innovation centre, through to plots for large scale research facilities or headquarter buildings up to 230,000 sq ft, it offers opportunities for a wide range of companies, from start-ups to international organisations.

Being just 10 miles from the recently-duelled A11 to Norwich and 17 miles from Cambridge, its location should mean it is superbly placed to become a high quality, attractive and sustainable environment for science and technology businesses, and to develop close links with the other two clusters on Mr Osborne's radar.

And let's not forget University Campus Suffolk, a showcase for biosciences and scientific, clinical and technological innovations. This renowned centre is helping produce confident, employable, professional graduates ready to solve real world problems and face the challenges of the twenty-first century.

We also have what is recognised as one of the leading centres of technical innovation in the communication world based at Adastral Park, BT's Global Research and Development Headquarters. 'Innovation Martlesham' is a joint initiative, between BT and local authorities, to encourage ICT-related companies to co-locate, collaborate and innovate.

With regard to investment in road and rail, our transport infrastructure also needs to be on the agenda. Traffic jams and delays

on the key A12 and A14 road links into the county are causing headaches for those on business journeys, whilst slow rail services are not conducive to modern container traffic and commuter expectations.

Whilst Norwich and Cambridge have enjoyed a high profile for their research and science facilities, we need to ensure Suffolk has equal claim to government attention.
